"Blessed is the one
who does not walk in step with the wicked
or stand in the way that sinners take
or sit in the company of mockers,
but whose delight is in the law of the Lord,
and who meditates on his law day and night.
That person is like a tree planted by streams of water,
which yields its fruit in season
and whose leaf does not wither—
whatever they do prospers."

Psalm 1:1-3

Lately, it seems like everywhere that we look something is bursting into bloom. We are surrounded by the colors of spring, the green of the grass and the trees, the vibrant hues of different flowers that are opening up all around us. When I pull into the church parking lot, I can smell the beautiful aroma of the lilac trees as I walk past them. The flowers in the prayer garden are truly a sight to behold. We see all around us the new life of spring.

These colors and smells and sights help us to remember the truth of the words of Scripture. At the very beginning of the book of Psalms, we find a sharp contrast drawn between two groups of people. The first group of people, which the psalmist refers to as the righteous, are those who seek to follow God's ways. The way of the righteous is characterized by studying God's law and meditating on his word. These people are compared to trees planted by streams of water. They grow. They bloom. They are healthy and strong. They demonstrate life to the world. The new life of spring that we see all around us can serve as a tangible reminder to us of the new life that God offers to us in Christ.

This first group, the righteous, is contrasted with another group that the psalmist calls the wicked. The wicked do not follow God's ways. They do not learn from his word. They do not reflect the life of God to those around them. The wicked are also compared to vegetation. However, instead of being compared to strong and beautiful trees planted by streams of water, they are compared to dead chaff that the wind blows away. They do not show life to the world, but death.

So, as we enjoy the beauty of spring that we see all around us, may we be reminded of the hope and promise of God's word, that when we seek to live in God's ways and reflect on his word, that we are like mighty trees planted by streams of water.

Preparing Gift of the Heart Kits

As a mission opportunity, Mission & Society offers the congregation an opportunity to assemble 100 School Kits as part of PC(USA)'s Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Program and Church World Service **Gift of the Heart Kits**. The chosen kit is the School Kit and follows a prescribed format that has an estimated value \$15. The assembled kits will be forwarded to Church World Service for distribution to disaster areas. As you can imagine, floods, hurricanes, tornados, earthquakes, and fires wipe out so many needed items including what students need in school. The School Kits provide students with materials to help them begin to reestablish some normality in school life.

Each kit includes:

- 1 pair of blunt scissors (rounded tip)
- 3 70-count spiral notebooks or tape-bound pads of 8" x 10 1/2" ruled paper or pads
- with 200-210 sheets of ruled paper. Do not include filler paper.
- 1 30-centimeter ruler (12")
- 1 hand-held pencil sharpener
- 6 new pencils with erasers
- 1 large eraser
- 1 box of 24 crayons
- 1 cloth bag, 12" x 14" to 14" x 17" finished size cotton cloth bag with cloth handles

What can you do?

We need sewers to make the bags following a provided pattern, shoppers, financial supporters (a.k.a. checkwriters), and attendees to come together to assemble kits.

- Perhaps you are interested in being part of a sewing circle (if you don't have a sewing machine, you could cut out and pin fabric pieces).
- Perhaps you would like to purchase scissors or pencils or other items else on the list.
- Perhaps you would like to donate funds.
- Perhaps you would like to pray for the project and for the students who will receive the kits.

We will be sewing and collecting items over the summer to conclude with a covered-dish dinner event in the late summer to early fall.

Just like Dad

At the beginning of his ministry career, Jerry Steen supplemented his income by mixing animal feed. When his two young boys greeted him at home, they laughed at his dusty appearance before he headed to the shower. "I didn't think too much of this until I was washing my car and saw my older son doing something very strange," Steen recalls. "He was picking up the gravel and stones in our drive and rubbing them into his pants." Curious, the father asked what the boy was doing. "I want to be dusty like you, Dad!" his son replied.

For Steen, that was an eye-opener. "I realized that if a child would look up to his father for being dusty and want to copy his father," he says, "a child could look up to his father and follow him for anything." What traits and qualities are you modeling and passing on — to your own kids and to anyone else who looks up to you?
